Where can I find it?

Q: I'm trying to find Blue Hill Grains. These are heirloom grains, and I would love to try making some recipes using them, but I can't find them. I'm willing to try different ones, but I'm especially eager to see the spelt and emmer combination. I'm computer illiterate, so researching online doesn't work for me. Can you help me in locating these, please? Thank you so much.

A: Move over heirloom tomatoes, here come the grains. Blue Hill Grains offers several heirloom varieties, including Waspie Valley corn and emmer wheat. You'll be pleased to know that Williams-Sonoma, 4475 Roswell Road, Marietta, 678-560-3660, recently started stocking these. You can find 2-pound bags of Blue Hill Grains Spelt-and-Summer blend, which offers a combination of emmer wheat (also known as farro), Bavarian spelt and Oberkulmer spelt for \$12.95. These organic grains are grown on small sustainable farms in upstate New York.

Q: I am looking to see if you can find Grandma Brown's Home Baked Beans. They are made in Mexico, N.Y. You take them from the can and then bake them in the oven. Thanks.

A: Christine, I spoke to someone at Grandma Brown's and was told there are no retail outlets in Georgia that sell these New York favorites that have been around since the Great Depression. And while the company has no website or email, you can reach Grandma Brown's Beans Inc. by calling 315-963-7221 if you want to place an order. They're available in cases of a dozen 16-ounce cans for \$45 and two dozen 16-ounce cans for \$71. Prices include shipping to Georgia. They're also available online at www.amazon.com.

Q: Where can I find Pinaud Clubman talc? It was widely available, but I can't find it anywhere now. Thanks for your help.

A: This talc has been around since 1810, according to Pinaud. Today, it's still used in many barbershops. You can find Pinaud Clubman talc in the green shaker can for \$4.39 each at Sally Beauty Supply, 2625 Piedmont Road, Atlanta, 404-231-4750.

Q: A good friend of my husband's will be visiting us from Australia. I would love to surprise him with the traditional sweet called Lamington. I don't bake at all. Is there some place where I can purchase these cakes freshly baked, and not online? The bakeries I've talked with don't make them. Thank you.

A: These famous Australian desserts are a simple teaming of small squares of yellow sponge cake dipped in chocolate, then covered with finely chopped coconut. You'll find Lamington baked fresh at Australian Bakery Cafe, 48 South Park Square, Marietta, 678-797-6222. Each individual Lamington costs \$2.65. At the cafe, you'll also find a wide variety of Aussie favorites, including meat pies and even Vegemite.

Brent McHenry loved making things for his house near Charleston, S.C. He built fences, benches and dollhouses. One day, McHenry crafted a swinging bed for his porch. A neighbor saw it and wanted a swing. So did another neighbor — and another. In 2008, McHenry founded Vintage Porch Swings in the basement of his home.

Last summer, McHenry's business and family out-

grew their home. With a full-time job in cancer research, McHenry knew he needed help. Valdosta native Vann Cochran joined the company, which now has a production facility and showroom.

The five models of bed and porch swings are named after McHenry's children (he has six plus another baby on the way). The Emerson is a top seller. So is the Avari, which is the original model. But three

new models are in the works.

Made of treated yellow pine, the charming handmade swings come with hardware, rope and simple instructions for hanging. They accommodate a twin mattress.
